Well, here we are rushing into April, while the calendar says it's spring, outside, not so much. Hopefully soon. We are rapidly approaching Easter, one more soup and sandwich to go. I'm not going to spend a lot of time on current events here in the beginning of my newsletter cover. Instead we will dive right into this months' topic:

The Second Commandment:

"You shall not take the name of the LORD your God in vain, for the LORD will not hold him guiltless who takes his name in vain." (Exodus 20:7)

At first look, it seems pretty straight forward, doesn't it? "You are not to take the name of God in vain." Martin Luther tells us that while the first commandment instructs the heart and teaches faith, the commandment directs us in a more outward fashion and directs our Lips and tongue into a right relationship with God. He then challenges us to answer the question, "What does the Second Commandment mean?" or "What does it mean to take the name of God in vain or to misuse it?"

So what does it mean, in reading through scripture and taking a closer look at both the small and large catechisms I personally found it to mean more than I originally thought. I, like I would assume most of you as well, had the understanding that I shouldn't' use God's name in a derogatory manner. Don't be using God's name to try and emphasis my point, don't try to make my point or try to draw attention away from my point by invoking God. In the world today as the lack of respect for God and anything having to with God increases the use of His name in vain increases as well. One of the things I found interesting in my reading is that Luther felt the same way in the 16th century. In the large catechism he writes: "Unfortunately it now is a common affliction throughout the world that there are just as few who do not use God's name for lies and all kinds of wickedness as there are few who trust in God with their whole heart." One part of that statement struck me in particular; "there are just a few who do not use God's name for lies and all kinds of wickedness..." So how are people using God's name for lies and wickedness?


One portion of the understanding of this commandment that I was perhaps lacking in, is that besides just using the Lord's name in a derogatory form is using God's name to support or back up a lie. Luther says: "It is a misuse of God's name if we call upon the Lord God in any way whatsoever to support falsehood or wrong of any kind." Now there's something to ponder. This includes taking oaths in court and wrongfully testifying or telling an untruth. When I was in the Air Force I became a Fire Investigator and attended a number of schools, including a schooling in how to question those suspected of committing a crime. Believe it or not one of the rules of thumb was when questioning someone when they started swearing to God that they did not do something, it usually meant they were indeed guilty and/or lying. The more fervent the oath the more certain the lie. I have had a few experiences in my life where that theory held true.

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Another missed understanding of this commandment is that of false preaching. Luther actually classifies it as the greatest abuse of the commandment. That is he says; "when false preachers arise and present their lying nonsense as God's Word."

Luther is so adamant about this and the other commandments he



says the following which may not fly well in the world today: "Above all else, therefor, our young people should be strictly required and trained to hold this as well as the other commandments in high regard. Whenever they violate them, we must be after them at once with the rod, confront them with the commandment, and continually impress it upon them, so that they may be brought up not merely with punishment but with reverence and fear of God." I will let you ponder this one on your own and will only say, in my opinion there are different types of rods.

I want to close this month with two more Luther quotes that again, in my opinion, fit as well today and they did in Luther's, if not perhaps even more.

First: "It is evident that the world is more wicked that it has ever been. This no government, no obedience, no fidelity, no faith—only perverse, unbridled people who know teaching or punishment can help. All of this is God's wrath and punishment upon such willful contempt of this commandment."

What should our response be?

Second: "To defy the devil, I say, we should always keep the holy name upon our lips so that he (the devil) may not be able to harm us as he would like to do. For this purpose it also helps to form the habit of commending ourselves each day to God—our soul and body, spouse, children, servants and all what we have—for his protection against every conceivable need.

Well, I pray you found this worth while and if you should have any questions please feel free to contact me at any time for further discussion.

Our final Lenten Wednesday is April 9th, followed by Palm Sunday April 13th, Maundy Thursday April 17th, Good Friday April 18th and Easter Sunday April 20th. Evening services are at 6:00 PM and Easter Sunday services are at 7:00AM and 9:00AM

With that I will close.





God's Instruments, God's Stewards

For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them. (Eph. 2:10)

Some pastors refer to these words as "the most forgotten words in the Scriptures." They are forgotten because they follow the familiar and critical words before it. The preceding two verses that overshadow Ephesians 2:10 are words of justification: "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast" (Eph. 2:8–9). These are words preached regularly. They are assigned as confirmation verses. They carry with them the very heart of what it means to be a redeemed child of God!


Precisely because the previous verses are so central to salvation, they often overpower our practice of stewardship! We have been saved by grace. This is certain and sure because of Jesus. Works play no role in our salvation. No credit taking for us! Grace is freely given. Faith is miraculously created by the Spirit and joyously received. This truth is so wonderful and so encompassing that we often miss out on WHY we are redeemed.


The grace of God revealed in Jesus calls us to faith. But St. Paul doesn't stop with grace and faith. He continues to the logical conclusion. Just like the creation declares the handiwork of God, the redemption of sinners like you and me declares His greatest handiwork! Redeemed stewards are created to reflect the grace and mercy God showers on us to others.

As Lutherans, we understand that good works flow from faith in Jesus Christ. They are the fruit of the tree of salvation into which we have been grafted by grace. Sanctification and stewardship are both on-going and active confessions of what the Lord has done in us. These works are not always spectacular. Many times, they are simply parents showing Jesus to their children. They are compassionate actions that live out the truth of the Gospel to co-workers and even complete strangers. While they can be grand endeavors, more likely they are simple, beautiful works which highlight what Jesus has done in us.


These works aren't random either. They have been planned by God. God planned to use you as a faithful steward as you walk the road that leads you through your daily life. There are no chance encounters or coincidences. They have been planned by the Lord of the universe for the benefit of His creation. Good works are what point to God's greatest work: Jesus!

He calls you and me to walk in this faith, which flows from this grace, which has been poured out on us in Jesus. But even this is not to our credit. We are simply called to be faithful stewards of God's grace so that we may share it with those who need is as much as we do. God's Spirit carries us along in this. We are just the steward — the instrument in His hand to accomplish His plan and glorify Him!



Prepare for the Full Pink Moon - and the Paschal Full Moon!

micromoon. How is that different from a supermoon? Learn why we traditionally call it the "Pink Moon" and some fascinating facts and folklore.

When to See the Full Moon in April 2025

Venture outside on Saturday, April 12, to catch a glimpse of April's full Pink Moon. This full Moon reaches peak illumination at 8:22 p.m. Eastern Time.

For the best view of this lovely spring Moon, find an open area and watch as the Moon rises just above the horizon. At this point, it will appear its biggest and take on a golden hue!


April Micromoon

April's full Moon is a "Micromoon" this year. Think of this term as the opposite of a "Supermoon." It simply means that the full Moon is at its farthest point from Earth (not the nearest point). In astronomical terms, we call this "apogee." Specifically, April's Micro full Moon is about 252,225 miles from Earth.

Why is the Moon nearer or farther (in this instance) from Earth? Simple: The Moon orbits Earth in an elliptical path. One side is nearer to Earth, and one side is farther. This distance affects the Moon's size and brightness, although it's probably not visible to the naked eye. The perceived size of the Moon from Earth is more related to the "Moon Illusion" and how close the Moon appears to the horizon; in this case, it's high above the horizon, so it may not appear to loom over us the way it appears when it's near the horizon.

Why Is It Called the Pink Moon?

The full Moon names used by *The Old Farmer's Almanac* come from various sources, including Native American, Colonial American, and European sources. Traditionally, each full Moon



name was applied to the entire lunar month in which it occurred, not only to the full Moon.

Although we wish the name "Pink Moon" had

Although we wish the name "Pink Moon" had to do with the color of the Moon, the reality is not quite as mystical or awe-inspiring. In truth, April's full Moon often corresponded with the early springtime blooms of a certain wildflower native to eastern North America: *Phlox subulata*—commonly called creeping phlox or

moss phlox-which also went by the name

"moss pink."

Pink moss phlox, or "moss pink," lends its nickname to the April Moon.



Thanks to

this seasonal association, this full Moon came to be called the "Pink" Moon! April's full Moon often plays a role in religion, too. Specifically, in Christianity, this Moon is known as the Lenten Moon if it is the last full Moon of the winter season (i.e., if it occurs before the spring equinox) or as the Paschal Full Moon if it is the first full Moon of spring (i.e. if it occurs after the spring equinox).

This year, April's full Moon (April 12, 2025) occurs after the spring equinox (March 20, 2025), making it the Paschal Moon. April's full Moon will be the first full Moon of the spring season and, therefore, will determine the date of Easter this year. Read more about how Easter's date is determined.

Alternative April Moon Names

In April, Moon names reference spring abound!

Breaking Ice Moon (Algonquin) and Moon When
the Streams Are Again Navigable (Dakota)
reference the melting ice and increased mobility
of the early spring season.


Budding Moon of Plants and Shrubs (Tlingit) and Moon of the Red Grass Appearing (Oglala) speak to the plant growth that will soon kick into high gear.

Other names refer to the reappearance of certain animals, including Moon When the Ducks Come Back (Lakota), Moon When the Geese Lay Eggs (Dakota), and Frog Moon (Cree).

The holy Man said, "I don't understand."


"It is simple," said the Lord. "It requires but one skill. You see, they have learned to feed each other, while the greedy think only of themselves."
