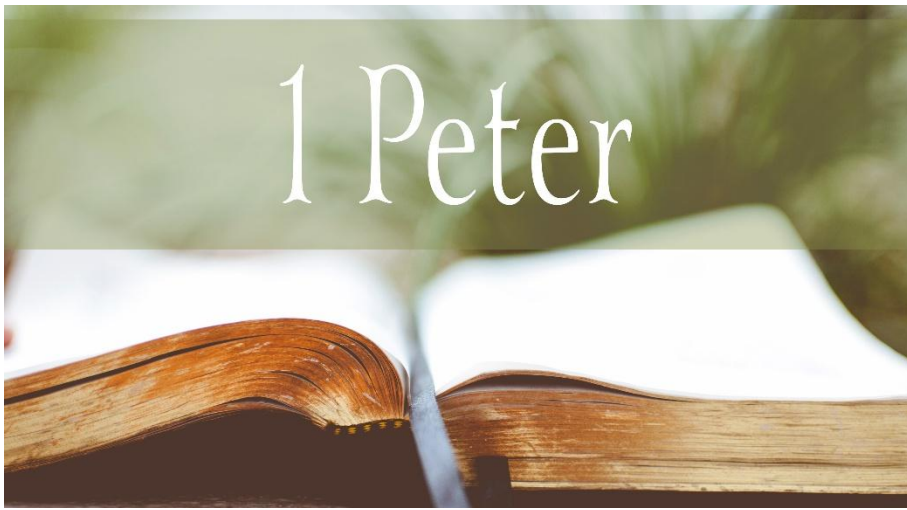

Resurrection Realities A Sermon Series on 1 Peter

Peter's life was forever changed by Christ's empty tomb. The reality of the resurrection began on Easter morning when John outran him to our Savior's tomb. When Peter was with the other apostles on Easter evening Jesus came and said, "Peace be with you." On the next Sunday Peter watched as Thomas saw Jesus and confessed "My Lord and my God." Christ also appeared on the shore of Galilee and Peter, fishing with

his friends, jumped out of the boat and swam to Jesus who was cooking breakfast for the disciples. This fisherman turned disciple was also present when Christ ascended into heaven. All told, Peter was an eyewitness to the risen Jesus on at least four different occasions. Around 65 AD, with the help of Silas, Peter composed his first letter and it explodes with resurrection joy and power.

This sermon series is called "Resurrection Realities." Following the second readings for Series A during Easter, these sermons discuss how the reality of Christ's resurrection transforms our lives. The texts and themes are as follows:

"Resurrection Realities on Suffering" (1 Peter 1:1–9) April 12, 2026

"Resurrection Realities on Lifestyle" (1 Peter 1:17–25) April 19, 2026

"Resurrection Realities on Relationships" (1 Peter 2:19–25) April 26, 2026

"Resurrection Realities on Identity" (1 Peter 2:2–10) May 3, 2026

"Resurrection Realities on Evangelism" (1 Peter 3:13–22) May 10, 2026

"Resurrection Realities on Satan" (1 Peter 4:12–19; 5:6–11) May 17, 2026

We have congregations reporting a noticeable uptick in worship attendance. Whether yours is among them is not the point. The question is why? Why now? Young people are turning to faith and worship because they are longing for something substantive, sturdy, and unchanging. For others the list includes unrest in the Middle East, uncertainty and frustration over never knowing if a news source is trustworthy, American politics, concern for children, an increasing Islamic presence across nations, and the potent reality of one's mortality. The latter is certainly true for me. And all the former – all the uncertainty and all the evidence of godlessness – not to mention my own weak flesh, cause me to come into His presence with thanksgiving.

The greatest reason for us to kneel before the Lord and His Table is this: He is risen. Has the Easter proclamation lost its punch? When the women announced the same to Peter and John, they *ran* to the tomb. Have you ever heard anything so significant that it caused you to run to see if it is true? A man in the 8th century BC is considered to have been as influential to the unbelieving Greek people of his day as Scripture is for us today. His name is Homer. Homer, the philosopher and poet, flat-out denied the resurrection of the dead. He laughed at the thought of it. Death does not work in reverse. Decaying flesh does not restore itself. It rots, everyone knows it, and so was the mindset of the day. The dead will not rise. Neither will elephants fly.

The Easter hymn, *If Christ Had Not Been Raised from Death* (LSB 486), repeats two words three times, once each at the halfway point of every stanza. And what are the two words? *But now*. But now? But now what? I'm glad you asked.

If Christ had not been raised from death Our faith would be in vain,
Our preaching but a waste of breath, *Our sin and guilt remain.*
But now the Lord is ris'n indeed; He rules in earth and heav'n:
His Gospel meets a world of need—In Christ we are forgiv'n.

While stanza one relates Christ's resurrection to the elimination of our biggest problem – our sin and our guilt, stanza two recognizes other looming problems. If Christ still lay within the tomb, then life is futile, death is the end, and we face it with fear.

If Christ still lay within the tomb Then death would be the end,
And we should face our final doom With neither guide nor friend.
But now the Savior is raised up, So when a Christian dies
We mourn, yet look to God in hope—In Christ the saints arise!

No one likes lies. We have the Easter truth. Christ is risen! Stanza three of our hymn recognizes the importance of truth and lies, and points to our joy in the restoration, the resurrection to come when He appears again.

If Christ had not been truly raised His Church would live a lie;
His name should nevermore be praised, His words deserve to die.
But now our great Redeemer lives; Through Him we are restored;
His Word endures, His Church revives In Christ, our risen Lord.

But now our great Redeemer lives. No lie. At stake is not only the matter itself, whether Jesus has been raised. What is at stake are the consequences if Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, then our faith is in vain, we are still in our sins, and death is not the end. Isn't? We just sang in stanza two that death *is* the end if Christ is not raised. That is true in keeping with the context of stanza two. If Christ is not raised, death ends life, and there is no resurrection and no everlasting life, either. But the other side of the coin is even more horrific. If Christ is not raised, death is *not* the end. If Christ is not raised, death is the doorway to damnation. There is a lot riding on this. The disciples knew it. They ran to the tomb. Later, Paul would meet the risen Jesus, too. He designated an entire chapter in one of his letters to write about Christ's resurrection, the greatest of all truths and source of this hymn's outline.

But now the Lord is risen indeed. In Christ we are forgiven. In Him we live to love and serve one another, and in Christ we will arise.

Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed! Alleluia! *Pastor Shoup*

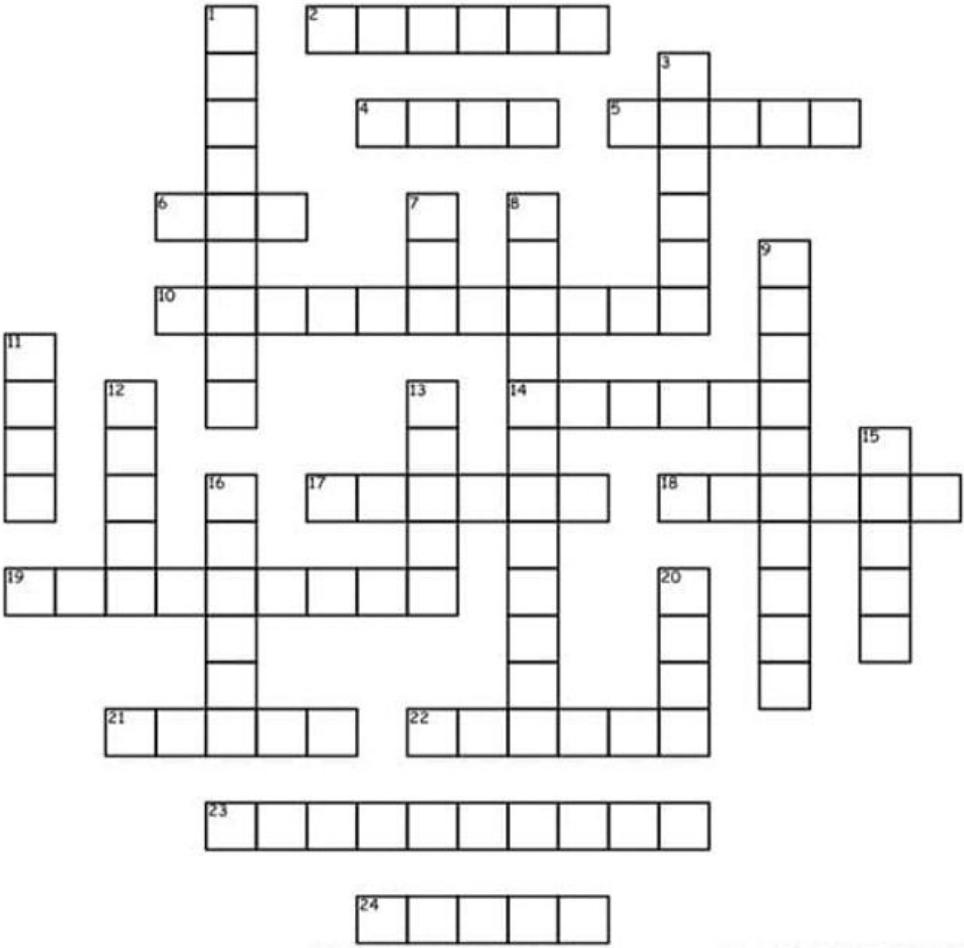

COOK'S CORNER

Tater Tot Casserole

Ingredients

1 lb boneless, skinless chicken breasts cubed
1 tbsp olive oil garlic salt to taste
1 c sour cream $\frac{1}{2}$ c milk
1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -2 lbs frozen tater tots
1 c shredded cheddar cheese divided

Instructions

In a small bowl, mix sour cream and milk together. Set aside.

Saute chicken in 1 tbsp olive oil. Season with garlic salt. As soon as the chicken is cooked through, remove from heat.

Pour sour cream mixture and $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of cheese over chicken. Mix well.

Pour into an 8x8 baking dish.

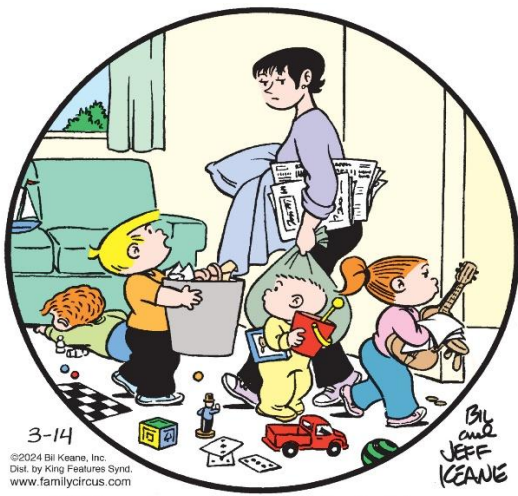
Add a single layer of frozen tater tots over the creamy chicken mixture. Top with remaining $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cheese.

Bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes, until the tots are golden brown and chicken mixture is bubbling.

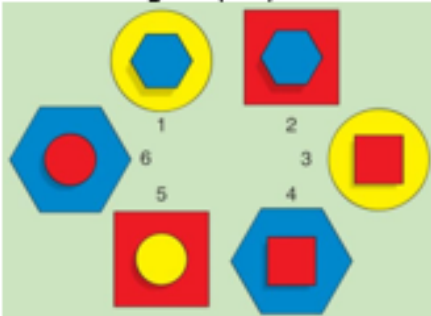

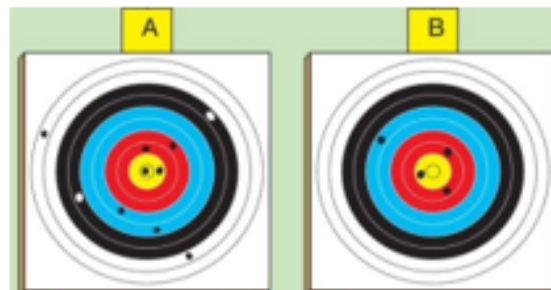
