February, two months into the New Year already, Ground Hog's Day rapidly approaching. I don't know if you have every really thought about it or not, but whether he sees his shadow or not, no matter how you cut it, we still have at least 6 weeks of winter left. It is in a sense a reminder that regardless of how things are hyped up in the media certain things in life are inevitable. Benjamin Franklin is credited with the saying "but in this world nothing is certain but death and taxes". According to EnglishClub.com there are three possible interpretations of Ben's statement: 1) We cannot be 100% sure about anything (except dying and having to pay the taxman - in this case the idea of death and taxes are added for humor). 2) We cannot escape taxation (in this case the idea of death serving only to highlight the certainty of taxes). 3) We can be absolutely sure that we will die (in this case the idea of taxes being added for humor). So which is it? I believe, in a Biblical sense, I have the answer, none of the above. Option 1) Incorrect, for as Christians we know with 100% certainty there are Biblical truths we can count on. 2) Incorrect, while it doesn't seem like it today in the United States, taxation is not a certainty, and I would feel safe in saying in some parts of the world there are people who have never, nor will ever, pay taxes. 3) This too, believe it or not, is also incorrect. We are not all assured we will die. Now you might say, but we all die? Well right off the top of my head I can think of at least two cases where that is not the truth, remember Elijah? Or Enoch? Now besides those two, as far as I know everyone else has died. But does that mean that all of us reading this will die? The best I can do for you is say maybe, because should our Lord and Savior return before our death, then those of us alive right now will never die! Now none of us, no one, except the God himself, knows when that day is, so between now than then, yes, we may die. But that is where the comment to option 1) comes in. Because of those 100% truths of the Bible, God's written Word, because of God's promise to us, because of what Jesus Christ did for us through His death and resurrection, we have a 100% assurance that we, like Jesus will be raised from the dead, into everlasting life. As Paul told the Corinthians (1 Cor. 15:50-58): We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed, ⁵² in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed. ⁵³ For this perishable body must put on the imperishable, and this mortal body must put on immortality. ⁵⁴ When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written:

"Death is swallowed up in victory." ⁵⁵ "O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?" ⁵⁶ The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. ⁵⁷ But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁵⁸ Therefore, my beloved brothers (and sisters), be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.

The one thing that we can be completely assured of is that through the power of the Holy Spirit, by faith we have been saved and we will be raised imperishable, immortal, to live forever in the presence of our savior. That is even surer than death or taxes.

I would also like to that the opportunity here to again thank everyone for their support, prayers, and hugs over the last couple months, feel free to keep them up. We have an amazing church family and I pray for you all daily and thank God for all of you.

quests confidential and not discuss them with others, but caller discretion is advised.


SUNDAY SCHOOL SCOOP Our winter Sunday School session is in full swing. The children

Stewardship Thoughts

For this month's writing we go to the ESV The Lutheran Study Bible, where five reasons to give tithes and offerings are listed.

The Lord speaks against insincere offerings intended to impress other people (Is. 1:10-17; Mt. 6:204; Mk 12:41-44). He desires that we give cheerfully and that we honor His generous gifts to us. Scripture includes the following good reasons to present tithes and offerings to God:

1) Thankfulness to God for the blessings He provides us through the Gospel (Dt. 14:22-29, Rom 15:25-28;, 2Co. 9:7).

2) Desire to support the mission of preaching the Gospel so that others may partake of God's peace and salvation (Rm 15:28b; Php 1:3-5; 4:14-20).

3) Desire to show support and care for church workers (Nu 18:21-24; Ne 12:44; gal. 6:6-7; 1Tim 5:17-18).

4) God commanded tithing under the Old testament, by which he has set before us an enduring example of faithful giving (Lv 27:32; Gn 14:18-20; Heb. 7:1-10).

50 God challenged His people to test His generosity by demonstrating their generosity in giving to His temple (Mal. 3:6-12)

Early in Israel's history, the priests at the temple received offerings of grain, fruit, or animals. Later, offerings of money were placed in a chest at the temple, which stood by the entryway so that people could deposit their money (2Ki 12:0; 2Ch 24:4011); the passing of offering plates is a modern innovation.

I was already scheming how to announce morning recess with the students "indoors" since I was not eager to face nature's blower plugged into a stiff wind and set by the temp of winterice.

but rather he held his wings posed like a dancer and let the wind do the work. This bird-pilot was out for a morning joy-ride.

So there you have it. Me seeking shelter in the social hall, and an eagle facing the wind for the ride of his life. Truly the forces that blow into our days are a matter of perspective. What is a hardship to one person becomes an opportunity to another. While disciples toss with fear in a boat, Jesus chooses to walk on the water. When the Children of Israel face death by the Egyptians, Moses stretches out his hands (wings) and parts the Red Sea.

There doesn't seem to any human-response formula to the events that turn our lives upside down, but it is worth remembering that we belong to the all-sufficient God when difficulties blow our way. Now it is evening. The wind chimes are ringing and temps dropping for we are not out of this Arctic blast yet. Join me in learning from eagles. That as we are tossed by forces out-of-our-control, God's grace will power us to spread our wings of faith for the joy-ride of our lives.
