
¹³ No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it. (1 Corinthians 10:13)

How's that for an opening thought? I have found this verse of scripture to be both reassuring as well as a bit scary. Reassuring because while I know I will be tested I know that the Lord knows, and he will provide me with a way through whatever temptation it is that I am facing. It is scary in that I must realize that I will be tempted, and I must rely not just on myself but on the Lord to see me through it. I will not make it on my own.

I believe that is the attitude that the Apostle Paul took, he shared that understanding with the Christians in Roman and with us when he said this:

³⁷ No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹ nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:37-39)



As long as we have faith in our Lord Jesus Christ and repent for our sins, we are forgiven and nothing, I repeat nothing, can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Now there is a thought to take home with you as this winter turns cold and continues on. It should warm your heart and help see you through the struggles of this life, the little tests we face each day and the big tests that drop on us from out of nowhere. The Lord's deeds are spectacular. They should be studied by all who enjoy them.

Psalm 111:2

What the Lord does is spectacular. But in this passage, the psalmist points out that only a few devout people notice what God has done. Most people don't praise God or thank Him. They never say, "The Lord's deeds are spectacular." Though they are completely surrounded by His gifts, they have gotten used to them. They take advantage of what God has given them, rooting around in God's gifts like a hog in a bag of feed. They say, "What's so special about the fact that the sun shines, fire gives warmth, the ocean provides fish, the earth yields grain, cows have calves, women give birth to children, and hens lay eggs? These things happen every day!"

Is something insignificant just because it happens every day? If fire only existed in one place on earth, I think it would be more precious than gold or silver. If there were only one well in the world, I imagine that a drop of water would be worth more than a thousand dollars.

God showers people with rich and wonderful blessings. But how ungrateful and blind people are! They don't recognize these blessings as amazing miracles from God, so they won't admire them, give thanks for them, or act happy about them. However, if a clown can walk a tightrope or train monkeys, people are ready to admire and praise him for it. The psalmist points out that the Lord's deeds are spectacular, But those deeds are only appreciated in the eye's of God's faithful followers.

Lyrics For The Hymn



Sir Robert Grant

This hymn was written by Sir Robert Grant, a Scottish Anglican who, because of his father's association with the East India Company, was born in India in 1779. Robert's father, Charles Grant supported Wilberforce, an early and effective opponent of slavery. Both father and son served as members of Parliament and directors of the East India Company. Robert wrote this hymn in 1833, a year before being appointed



Governor of Bombay, a position that he held until his death.

"O Worship The King" was first published in Henry Bickersteth's *Christian Psalmody* of 1833. However, its antecedents date long before that time. It is taken from Psalm 104, although it is too free to be called a mere paraphrase. Furthermore, it is actually based on an earlier metrical version of the psalm which appeared in the 1561 *Anglo-Genevan Psalter* made by William Kethe (flourished c. 1555-1593). Later in 1833 Grant introduced a bill in the British House of Commons to remove all civil restrictions imposed against Jews. The following year, 1834, he was appointed Governor of Bombay, India, at which time he was also knighted. Returning to the land of his birth, he died on July 9, 1839, at Dalpoorie, western India, where a medical college which bears his name was erected as a memorial to him. Grant had produced a total of twelve hymns which were published posthumously by his brother Charles, Lord Glenelg, under the title *Sacred Poems* in 1839.

Tunes For The Hymn

The meter of the hymn "O Worship the King" is in 10:10:11:11 and the popular tune use to sing the text is LYONS. The tune was originally composed by Joseph Martin Kraus. Kraus is a classical era composer of German origin.

The **LYON** tune was adapted by **Michael Haydn** (1737-1806) from the **Kraus' sonata**. This tune is great for the text with its steady rise and reasonable progressions. Each of the phrases of the tune ascent as the text exclaimed the supreme nature of God.

Another tune that is popular with the text of the hymn "O Worship the King" is called **HANOVER**. The tune composition is widely attributed to **William Croft**. This is the tune that our hymn is based on in Lutheran Service Book

Basically, the HANOVER tune is spirited and has beautiful harmony. Although the Hanover tune is an old tune and actually follows some pattern of old tunes.

In particular, the Hanover was first seen in Supplement to the New Version of Psalms published in 1708 by Dr. Nicholas Brady and Nahum Tate. The author of the hymn then was anonymous before the composer was ascribed to William Croft.

Kraus, Joseph Martin

Joseph Martin Kraus (b. Miltenberg am Main, Germany, 1756; d. Stockholm, Sweden, 1792) spent his youth in Germany, but in 1778 moved to Stockholm. He was elected to the Swedish Academy of Music and became the conductor of the court orchestra and eventually the best-known composer associated with the court of Gustavus III. On his travels, Kraus did meet Franz Joseph Haydn, who considered Kraus "one of the greatest geniuses I have met." Kraus wrote operas as well as many vocal and instrumental works.





Haydn, Michael

Johann Michael Hadyn Austria 1737-1806. Born at Rohrau, Austria, the son of a wheelwright and town mayor (a very religious man who also played the harp and was a great influence on his sons' religious thinking), and the younger brother of Franz Joseph Hadyn, he became a choirboy in his youth at the Cathedral of St. Stephen in Vienna, as did his brother, Joseph, an exceptional singer. For that reason boys both were taken into the church choir. Michael was a brighter student than Joseph, but was expelled from music school when his voice broke at age 17. The brothers remained close all their lives, and Joseph regarded Michael's religious works superior to his own. Michael played harpsichord, violin, and organ, earning a precarious living as a freelance musician in his early years. In 1757 he became kapellmeister to Archbishop, Sigismund of Grosswarden, in Hungary, and in 1762 concertmaster to Archbishop,

Hieronymous of Salzburg, where he remained the rest of his life (over 40 years), also assuming the duties of organist at the Church of St. Peter in Salzburg, presided over by the Benedictines. He also taught violin at the court. He succeeded Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, an intimate friend, as cathedral organist in 1781. He did not like seeing his works in print, and kept most in manuscript form. He never compiled or cataloged his works, but others did it later, after his death. Several of Michael Hadyn's works influenced Mozart. It has been said that Michael's brother, Joseph assisted him on "Worship the King".

Croft, William

William Croft, Mus. Doc. was born in the year 1677 and received his musical education in the Chapel Royal, under Dr. Blow. In 1700 he was admitted a Gentleman Extraordinary of the Chapel Boyd; and in 1707, upon the decease of Jeremiah Clarke, he was appointed joint organist with his mentor, Dr. Blow. In 1709 he was elected organist of Westminster Abbey. This amiable man and excellent musician died in 1727, in the fiftieth year of his age. A very large




