

Leaving Coins on a Grave: Meaning & History

Today we're going to be talking about the meaning and history behind leaving coins on a grave. Have you ever seen a penny, nickel, dime, or even quarter sitting on a headstone? You may have wondered who left it there, and why.

As it turns out, someone didn't accidentally lose the contents of their wallet while visiting the cemetery. And no, ghosts probably aren't leaving the coins there, either. Coins on graves are left intentionally by people who stop by the grave to pay their respects.

Let's take a more detailed look at this practice, and what it signifies.

History of Leaving Coins on Gravestones

Leaving coins on gravestones is a fairly common practice, developed over centuries through a blend of myth and ritual.

Ancient Greek Myth of Charon and the River Styx

To see the bigger picture of why people traditionally leave coins on gravestones, we first have to go back in time a little. Okay, back in time a *lot*. All the way back to ancient Greece.

Ancient Greek mythology tells us the story of Charon. He was the fabled **ferryman of the underworld** believed to navigate departed souls across the River Styx and into the land of the dead.

Charon needed payment to be able to carry out this service, and so coins were placed over the eyes or in the mouths of the deceased as remittance. Consequently, if no bribe was offered to Charon, access across the river was denied, and the soul of the deceased was cursed to roam its banks for a hundred years.

For those who thought that Christmas was over, Epiphany, celebrated on January 6, marks the final celebratory day of the Christian holiday season! While most people begin taking down their Christmas decorations by New Year's, there is still a full week before many practicing Christians complete their celebrations of the birth of Jesus Christ. It is commonly associated with the day the Three Wise Men arrived at the manger and has several different names throughout history and cultures.

HISTORY OF EPIPHANY

Epiphany is a Christian feast day celebrating the revelation of God incarnate as Jesus Christ. In Western Christianity, the feast commemorates the visit of the Three Wise Men who followed an angel to Bethlehem where Jesus was born. The day has also been referred to as Three Kings Day and Little Christmas by both Irish and Amish Christians. The Feast of the Epiphany concludes the twelve days of Christmastide and is the traditional end of the Christmas season.

As early as the fourth century, churches of the Eastern Roman Empire were celebrating Christmas on January 6. Those in the West were celebrating on December 25, which is why some places refer to the Feast of the Epiphany as Old Christmas. Since then, many cultures have developed their own names and traditions to celebrate this day. For example, in Scandinavia, they celebrate what they call Little Christmas Eve on December 23. In Spain, children traditionally did not receive their presents on Christmas Day but instead on January 6, in commemoration of the day the Wise Men arrived in Bethlehem bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. In Ireland, they also call Little Christmas Women's Christmas, because Irish men take on the household duties for the day. Other popular traditions include singing, chalking the door, having one's house blessed, eating a three kings cake, going to church, and winter swimming. It is also customary for many Christians to remove their Christ-

mas decorations on Epiphany Eve, although other Christian countries historically remove them on Candlemas, the conclusion of the Epiphanytide. According to the first tradition, those who fail to remember to remove their Christmas decorations on **Epiphany Eve must** leave them untouched until Candlemas.





After This Man Rescued a Cow from a Dairy Farm, the Two **Developed the Most** Unbelievable Friendship

On the edge of the city of Williamsburg, Virginia, resides Ryan Phillips and his very best friend, Jenna the cow, in just one of the many animal adoption stories that will warm your heart.



About two years ago, Ryan saw an ad for a newborn Holstein calf in North Carolina, just three hours from his home. After visiting a sanctuary in Maryland that rescues cows, Ryan's suspicion that cows are just "grass puppies" was confirmed. Playful and full of curiosity, cows have many similarities to pets you may find in your home. Since Ryan was able to see firsthand just how amazing these creatures really are, he decided to take a leap of faith and drive his Subaru Forester over to Durham, North Carolina to bring home Jenna, his very first cow.

Jenna was born on a dairy farm with her twin brother. Since female Holstein calves with a twin brother typically have a high chance of being infertile, Jenna and her brother were spray painted and prepared for slaughter just days after their birth. Luckily, the dairy farmer's daughter, Jenna, persuaded her father to find homes for these three-day-old calves instead of taking them to be killed. 
