As I sit down to write this month's newsletter cover I am looking back at a really strange week. And as I look back on it I realize life is full of all kinds of uncertainties. Now what makes me say these things. Well first was the snow of May 19th, worst winter driving conditions I faced all year as June and I headed to Little Girls Point. Mowed on Friday, snowed on Sunday, a bit unpredictable. Following that I had several encounters with individuals that were somewhat strange, and they will go untold. I also participated in the active shooter training drill that was held at Bretting's on Tuesday, I participated in my role as Chaplain for the Ashland Fire Department. One of the topics of discussion was the sorry state of our world that we would even have to consider training for such an occurrence. Then on Wednesday afternoon, I received a call from a member stating that he was unable to get into his home because someone had broken in while he was out and was involved in a police stand off and that that individual was later killed. His garage had a vehicle driven through it and there where bullet holes in his new refrigerator. Has the world gone crazy? This is Ashland! These things aren't supposed to be happening here. My grandson was a block away when the shooting started walking home from school. He is still in a bit of shock. As I spoke to our member about this incident the thing that really came to mind, and that, we were exceedingly grateful for; he was not home when his house was broken into. We thanked the Lord that the house was empty, so many other possible scenarios could have taken place there.

So, what do we take away from all of this? Well first and foremost we thank the Lord for watching over all of those who were involved and all of those who were trying to protect the community from danger. Secondly, we remember that we live in a broken and fallen world and until Christ returns we really shouldn't expect it to get a whole lot better. Satan is doing his best to shake our faith, to weaken our resolve, and to tear us away from our faith.

As I further contemplated all that had happened I reflected on scripture, the first verse to come to mind is from John 16:33:

I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have **tribulation**. But take heart; I have overcome the world. These verses followed: Acts 14:22 strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying that through many **tribulation**s we must enter the kingdom of God. Romans 8:35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall **tribulation**, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword?

We Christians have never been told life in this world will be easy, and actually as you see we have been told quite the opposite. So what do we do, how do we cope? Well what we encounter is not that much different than it was 2000 years ago. Paul's words to the Romans then are just as appropriate to us today. Romans 12:9-21

Outdo one another in showing honor. ¹¹ Do not be slothful in zeal, be fervent in spirit, serve the Lord. 12 Rejoice in hope, be patient in tribulation, be constant in prayer. ¹³ Contribute to the needs of the saints and seek to show hospitality. 14 Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. 15 Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶ Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly. Never be wise in your own sight. 17 Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all. 18 If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. 19 Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." 20 To the contrary, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head." 21 Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

TIME TREASURE TOUCH TRASH TALENT TESTIMONY TISSUE TECHNOLOGY

TESTIMONY

It might seem a bit strange to talk about the stewardship of testimony. But Jesus instructed His disciples of all ages to make disciples, teaching and baptizing and encouraging people to follow God's teachings (Matthew 28:18-20). He also told His first disciples that they were to be His witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:8).

As modern day disciples we also desire to be faithful witnesses, saying and doing all that we can to give witness to our Lord Jesus Christ who desires that all people be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth (1 Timothy 2:4).

St. Peter in his first letter (3:15) instructs us with these words: "But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." With that in mind, I would like to share with you a thought or two about a concept borrowed from the business world. It is called an "Elevator Speech". What it is, very simply, is a presentation you have worked on, planned, thought through, practiced, refined and worked on again that will tell a person the message you would like to share with them, in our case the Gospel message of Jesus Christ, in the amount of time you have with others on an elevator. (If you have more time you will, of course, be blessed to expand on your speech.) In short, it is a quick (the two minutes or so that you are on an elevator with someone) sharing of the Gospel that will excite the hearer, and through the power of the Holy Spirit, hopefully lead them to want to know more either then or at some other time. It is as simple and safe as telling the other person how God has impacted your life and sharing with them that He would love to do the same in their life.

What a privilege to be able to do the work that the angels of God long to do—that is, give our testimony of the joy, peace and hope that are ours because of the redeeming work of Jesus Christ. And what added joy we will have to take into eternity when the words of Daniel 12:3 come true: "Those who are wise will shine like the brightness of the heavens, and those who lead many to righteousness, like the stars forever and ever."

Eric Bochler is graduating from WITC — Ashland in Machine Tool Plans on staying in Ashland and joining the family business.



Now Jesus begins to talk. He starts the story with Moses, the prophets, and interprets the Scriptures right up to the death of Jesus. The story carried their feet and soon they arrived at home. A common practice in Asia is to invite a fellow-traveler home for a meal and a bed; it was easy for these disciples to offer this hospitality.

When they were seated at the table, the stranger took the bread, blessed the bread, broke the bread, and gave it to them...their eyes were opened, and they recognized Jesus and then he vanished from their sight. Dear Travelers, let us draw near to each other to talk and walk the good news of Jesus Christ. He is eager to fan the fires of our hearts that once again we might burn with His love and His hope. May our trips this summer include time on the road to Emmaus. A daily walk and talk with Jesus can make all the difference in the world. He is Risen Indeed. **Alleluia!**

Motion to accept Old Business reports by Warren. Second by Guski. MMC.


New Business:
