The main point is as follows: Romans 12: ¹⁴ Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. ¹⁵ Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. ¹⁶ Live in harmony with one another. Do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly. Never be wise in your own sight. ¹⁷ Repay no one evil for evil, but give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all. ¹⁸ If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. ¹⁹ Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave it to the wrath of God, for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." ²⁰ To the contrary, "if your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink; for by so doing you will heap burning coals on his head." ²¹ Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

The Restless Soul


For God alone, O my soul, wait in silence, for my hope is from him (Psalm 62:5).

WHY THE PIANO?

tor took a picture of the organ information that was needed and sent it to Minneapolis for them to figure out which kit we would need. We haven't heard back yet on a cost, when it could be installed or who needs to do it. We are working on it and we would like to get the organ playing during the live stream services. Pa-

tience is the key word for this undertaking.

Fund for Front Entrance repairs

As of April 1,2020 the Financial Secretary, upon request from the Chairman Of the Board of Trustees reported that donations to the fund for the repair of the front entrance stoop totaled \$2,987.00

The total project was contracted at \$7,080.00 with a stipulation of the possibility of some added costs should the cost of concrete increase in 2020.

We paid an earnest fee of \$708.00 in the fall of 2019 to be put on the spring schedule for 2020.

At this point this is where the project funding stands.



The Christian holiday of **Pentecost**, which is celebrated the 49th day (the seventh sunday) after Easter Sunday, ^[2] commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, as described in the Acts of the Apostles (Acts 2:1–31).

The holiday is also called "White Sunday" or "Whitsunday" or "Whitsun", especially in the United Kingdom, where traditionally the next day, Whit Monday, was also a public holiday (since 1971 fixed by statute on the last Monday in May). The Monday after Pentecost is a legal holiday in many European countries.

Written: Holy Week April 2020

"On that day the Lord will whistle for the fly that is at the end of the streams of Egypt, and for the bee that is in the land of Assyria." Isaiah 7:18

In December, I read this verse in the Book of Isaiah. Somehow this power of the Lord's whistle reminded me that every element of nature and life itself is under his control. The bedrock truth of this reality has become even more profound within the past two months.

While Herb and I were en route to Dubai, we noticed in Amsterdam the passengers boarding a flight for China were all wearing face masks. Even the airport workers in this area were gowned in hazmat-type gear. There was a February-rumor in the air that a virus was taking hold in our world... starting with China.

Sure enough within weeks after normal living with Joe and family in Dubai, everything was turned upside down as the coronavirus swept across the globe. Dubai responded and required that we keep a "social distance" from others, and wear face masks. Now it is Holy Week, and new rules demand we stay in the house unless we gain permission to go a grocery store or pharmacy. How a "microscopic-predator" can pack such control is amazing and scary.

Last Sunday was Palm Sunday. When Jesus approached Jerusalem, he asked for a lowly donkey to ride into the city. The amazing thing was that crowds gathered to greet him, waved palms of celebration, and threw coats on the road to welcome the king. But what is even more scary...is that five days later this same Jesus was mocked and beaten and hung on a cross to die. The God who whistles to the fly did not flinch and call off the "death" of His Son. He knew something greater was happening on that cross... that would turn the world upside down.

Yes, we know the Easter story. At first light on Sunday a few curious souls ran to the tomb where Jesus laid, and they found the stone was rolled away and an angel was keeping guard: "Why do you seek the living among the dead?" Was it a whistle that rolled the stone, or did the angel move the boulder? It doesn't matter...it happened, and

Jesus was no longer dead: He was alive!! The final straw of earthly despair was broken, and God revealed that He is the all-powerful living Word.

Cast all your care upon Him, for He cares for you.

1 Peter 5:7

So, folks, as we navigate these crazy days of lockdowns, masks, cabin fever, doubt, fear, isolation, silence... let us tune our ears to hear the whistle of God for when it is His time, He will call off this virus and heal our land and restore our lives. For Jesus died for everyone, and God will not sell short this great sacrifice of His Beloved Son. His love is unconditional, and He will keep His eternal promise to care for His sheep. Let us not be scared, but rather be amazed that God is in-charge of this right-side-up or upside-down world: Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!! Happy Easter to all!

Statement on the death of George Floyd and the ensuing riots

Discriminatory treatment of human beings on the basis of race is irrational evil and results in evil. It is folly, which can produce only anger and hatred. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." America's original sin of legal racism, the denial of human rights based on race, has reaped the whirlwind.

God's Word rejects racism. "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). "No one is righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). All are equally created by God. All are equally accountable to God. The sins of all are equally atoned for by Christ. All are equally precious to God. Racial animosity is the result of sin and is sin in itself. Racism is not acceptable in the church. Jesus Himself bids us love our neighbors as ourselves (Mark 12:31) and did so precisely while rejecting racial preference (cf. Good Samaritan, Luke 10:25–37).

Unity in the church according to the Augsburg Confession is defined by Article VII: "For it is sufficient for the true unity of the Christian church that the Gospel be preached ... and that the sacraments be administered in accordance with the divine Word." Christ and His gifts bring unity and equity in the church. Racial discrimination in or by the church is sin. Racial conflict in our nation calls every Christian to introspection. "It is time for judgment to begin at the household of God" (1 Peter 4:17). "Righteous indignation" without self-reflection and repentance is meaningless, or worse, hypocrisy.

The one who grievously and unjustly took the sacred gift of life from George Floyd — resulting in a charge of 3rd-degree murder — will, ironically, be given the very thing he denied his victim, due process of the law. Justice must be meted out according to the law. Others may be charged.

We weep for George Floyd, for his family and loved ones because he was robbed of life. We weep for our nation. We weep for those across our nation who believe their only recourse is destruction. We weep for police officers everywhere, who carry out their honorable vocations with courage and goodwill but find their task infinitely more challenging and dangerous in the wake of the sad events in Minneapolis. We pray for the safety of all and the welfare of those who have lost property and livelihood. We pray for the police who must stand against mayhem. We support the First Amendment rights of the peaceful protestors.

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We deplore injustice. We deplore destruction, robbery and doing physical harm to others. That, too, is injustice. We plead to citizens and governments of this nation for communities beset by poverty, crime and injustice. We plead for rational and unifying policies that will end injustices and address social breakdown, lack of economic access, and other factors that fuel anger, hatred and dissension.

We shall pray, but we shall do even more. We shall follow the ancient mandate of the prophet of Yahweh: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8).

And we shall proclaim Christ, "in season and out of season" (2 Timothy 4:2). "For one will scarcely die for a righteous person — though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die — but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:7–8).

If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory.

Put to death therefore what is earthly in you: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry. On account of these the wrath of God is coming. In these you too once walked, when you were living in them. But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth. Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge after the image of its creator. Here there is not Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave, free; but Christ is all, and in all.

Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. And above all these put on love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in one body. And be thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him (Colossians 3:1–17 ESV).
