





Good Friday is recognized as a holiday in only 12 states

Good Friday, the commemoration of Jesus's crucifixion, is not a federally recognized holiday, so it is up to each state to decide whether they want to acknowledge the day or not. The 12 states that recognize Good Friday as a holiday are Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, New Jersey, North Carolina, North Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas.

Germany banned dancing on Good Friday Since 1919, Germany has banned dance celebrations on religious holidays, including Good Friday, so holidays may be recognized in peace. The ban dates back to the Middle Ages but was not officially instituted until 1919.

Each American household is expected to

spend \$192 on Easter celebrations From gifts and decorations to candy and clothes, the average American household is expected to spend \$192 in celebration of Easter. This total average spending increases nearly every year.

People buy more candy for Easter than Halloween

Shockingly, Halloween is not the most popular holiday to buy candy, nor is Valentine's Day or Christmas. Instead, people buy the most candy for Easter with over \$800 million dollars in candy sales the week before the big day.

180 million eggs are purchased for Easter every year

Eggs are a big part of Easter celebrations. People dye, paint, hide, and eat them — not to mention the many other Easter crafts where eggs are used. All of those eggs add up to 180 million that are purchased

each year for Easter. Cherry is the most popular Jelly Belly flavor

Despite the hundreds of flavors Jelly Belly has created over the years, "Very Cherry," one of their original eight flavors is the most popular. It launched in



1976 and has held the title of 'favorite flavor' since 1998.

The Easter Bunny hopped into the United States in the 1700s

For kids and adults alike, the Easter Bunny has long been a symbol of the holiday. Though the exact origins of the fluffy, long-eared mammal are unknown, Americans first started making nests for a mythical rabbit in the 1700s. The tradition started when German immigrants settled in the United States, bringing with them their tradition of an egg-laying hare called "Osterhase."

The largest chocolate Easter egg was over 34 feet tall

Though most Easter eggs will fit easily within your palm, that isn't the case with all of them. In 2011, the largest Easter egg ever created was made in Italy, measuring over 34 feet tall and weighing 7,200 kilograms. The best part? Aside from an internal steel frame to keep it in place, the giant egg was made out of pure chocolate and marshmallow.



Dyeing eggs began in Ukraine

The art of dyeing eggs began in Ukraine We have Ukrainians to thank for the art of egg dyeing, which originated in ancient Ukraine and is called pysanka. Painted pysanka eggs were even

believed to have powers that would bring fertility and good harvests in the new season. It used to take more than a day

to make a single Peep

Believe it or not, it used to take 27 hours to make a single Peep back in 1953. Back then, Rodda Candy Company made the marshmallow chicks with a pastry tube, and the Peeps took over a day to set. Today, you can have a fresh Peep ready for eating in just six minutes.

Most people go for the ears first on a chocolate bunny Chocolate bunnies almost always fi

Chocolate bunnies almost always find their way into Easter baskets around the world, but not everyone can agree on how to eat them. According to a 2021 survey conducted by WalletHub, 78% of people go for the ears first when enjoying the treat while the remaining 22% are evenly split between going for the tail or

feet first.

The largest chocolate Easter bunny took eight days to make

In 2017, nine professional chocolatiers in Brazil set the record for the largest-ever chocolate Easter bunny, which took eight days to create. The finished rabbit stood nearly 15 feet tall and weighed over 9,000 pounds.



In Switzerland, a cuckoo bird delivers Easter eggs to kids Rather than looking forward to a visit from the Easter Bunny, children in Switzerland are raised to believe a cuckoo bird is

the animal that delivers their Easter eggs and treats.

The world's largest Easter egg hunt had over half a million eggs Also in 2007, Florida's Cypress Gardens Adventure Park hosted the world's largest Easter egg hunt, which included a recordbreaking 501,000 hidden eggs. Nearly 10,000 people joined in on the epic search.

The most expensive Easter egg ever sold

at auction went for \$18.5 million A gold-and-pink Fabergé egg covered in diamonds was once created by the Romanov family as an engagement gift for French aristocrat Baron Edouard de Rothschild. Over 100 years later in 2007, that egg sold for \$18.5 million.

Every year, the White House hosts a special Easter celebration

The White House is known for throwing a good holiday party, and Easter is no exception. For over 130 years, the president has hosted an Easter Egg Roll on the South Lawn, where children roll pastel hard-boiled eggs with a spoon. The traditional began during Rutherford B. Hayes' administration in 1878 after Congress banned children from rolling eggs on Capitol Hill.

In Australia, the Easter mascot is a bilby

Children in Australia also don't expect a visit from the Easter Bunny. Instead, the traditional Easter mascot in Australia is the bilby, an endangered burrowing marsupial, which is also known as the rabbiteared bandicoot.



People used to throw eggs instead of hiding them

In medieval Britain, people used to participate in an egg-throwing festival at church rather than an egg hunt. To start, the priest would throw a hardboiled egg to one of the choir boys. That egg would then get tossed from one choir boy to the next. When the clock struck 12, whoever had the egg was declared the winner.

The official flower of Easter is the White Lily All spring flowers have a place during Easter,



but the White Lily holds a special title as the official flower of Easter. This tradition began when an American florist imported the flower to the United States

from Bermuda in the 1880s, and they've remained popular ever since, symbolizing new life and purity.

The tradition of wearing new clothes on Easter goes back centuries

Buying a festive Easter outfit is not only a great excuse to go shopping but is also in keeping with one of the holiday's oldest traditions. Christians began wearing new clothes on Easter in Medieval times to symbolize the resurrection

of Jesus Christ. Easter bonnets are a relatively new tradition While dressing up for Easter is nothing



new, bonnets didn't become fashionable until 1933. It was during this year that the composer Irving Berlin popularized them with his song, "Easter Parade," which has lyrics about elite New Yorkers showing off their Easter outfits.

Americans consume 16 billion jelly beans for Easter

Jelly beans first became a traditional Easter candy in the 1930s, and they're still wildly popular today. According to a survey by WalletHub in 2021, candy eaters in the United States consume 16 billion jelly beans each Easter, which is enough candy to circle the globe three times.
