



The Mountain Jop

....or So You Think



God is in Control Closing Devotion

"Be still, and know that I am God" (Ps.46:10a). Anyone who has children in their lives has probably uttered "Be still!" on more than one occasion for any number of reasons. You may even know "antsy" adults you would like to tell to "Be still!"

In Psalm 46, God is telling His children to, "Be still. Enough already, stop spinning your wheels." He admonishes us. God wants us to realize that He is the One in control. No amount of worrying, fretting, or concern on our part can change anything. In fact, God views those reactions as distrust.


Jesus says, "Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me" (John 14:1).

Answers to "Sayings Commonly Quoted"

No. 1 "MONEY IS THE ROOT OF ALL EVIL."

This one is actually a half-truth. The Bible says this: "For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils. It is through this craving that some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pangs" (1 Timothy 6:10). There's nothing wrong with money, or material possessions, unless we let them control us. Loving wealth more than we love God or our neighbors is a quick road to trouble. To keep money in its proper context, we should remember that everything we have is a gift from God, and we can thank Him by using our resources to serve others. It's surprising how many quotes from Shakespeare are attributed to the Bible. This one's from Hamlet, Act I, Scene III, and it's definitely nothing like the truth. Our culture is very keen on "following your heart." But the Bible tells us, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately sick; who can understand it?" (Jeremiah

17:9). No. 3 "A LEOPARD CAN'T CHANGE HIS SPOTS."

This is a whole truth! The verse is Jeremiah 13:23, "Can the Ethiopian change his skin or the leopard his spots? Then also you can do good who are accustomed to do evil." This verse is a warning that the choices we make really matter. Habits are hard to break—especially bad habits. And when it comes to our "natural self," as we talked about in the previous answer, we're powerless to change ourselves. Only God has the power to change us, and He is ready and waiting to erase our painful past: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17, and see also Romans 8:1–2). Incidentally, there's no reason to think this verse is suggesting there's anything wrong with an Ethiopian's dark skin, any more than there's anything wrong with a leopard having spots.

No. 4 "GOD HELPS THOSE WHO HELP THEMSELVES."

This one's pretty popular because it appeals to our desire to be in charge of our own lives. But it's nothing like the truth!

Romans 5:6, 8 tells us: "For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. ... God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." In other words, God sent Jesus Christ to us because we were helpless to change our spiritual condition without

Him. Psalm 68:5 rejoices, "Father of the fatherless and protector of widows is God in his holy habitation." In ancient times, no one was less able to help themselves than widows and fatherless children, yet God helped them. Jesus points out in Matthew 5:45 that God "makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the just and on the unjust," regardless of what they do. Read Luke 12:13–34 for more thoughts on self-reliance, and see Genesis 3 for what happened the first time humans decided to take charge of their own destiny. That's not to say Christians should sit on their hands. It just means our business is to "seek his kingdom, and these things will be added to you" (Luke 12:31).

No. 6 "God will never give you more than you can handle."

This one's only half true. God will never give us more than we can handle—as long as we are depending on Him instead of our own resources. This saving probably began as a paraphrase of 1 Corinthians 10:13: "No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." As you can see, it's a great example of the way that quoting only half of a verse usually leaves you with only half of a truth!

No. 7 "Cleanliness is next to godliness.

"It sounds good on the surface, but you won't find this one in the Bible. Actually, the fact that it sounds good on the surface is the problem. God isn't very concerned with our surfaces, is He? He certainly doesn't disapprove of good hygiene—but He's well aware that good hygiene is a luxury that not everyone can afford. Imagine saying this to someone who has to haul every drop of water home in a jerry can from a spring 5 miles away! God is a lot more concerned with the cleanliness of our hearts: "Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from what is dishonorable, he will be a vessel for honorable use, set apart as holy, useful to the master of the house, ready for every good work" (2 Timothy 2:21). That's a kind of cleanliness we can afford.

No. 8 "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them."

This is Matthew 18:20. But it's not an excuse for staying home from church, as many people seem to take it.

Matthew 18:20 comes at the end of a passage on church discipline. The lesson here is that church discipline is not a one-person job, and if those entrusted with it earnestly seek God's will over how to handle a particular situation, they can count on God's presence even in the tough decisions. In these days when far too many churches are being accused (often rightly) of failing to confront abuse in their midst, a correct understanding of this verse is a valuable reminder. God's opinion matters far more than man's—we need

to be unflinching in our church discipline instead of trying to

pretend we're perfect!

No. 9 "Spare the rod, spoil the child"

Half truth This one is probably a paraphrase of Proverbs 13:24, "Whoever spares the rod hates his son, but he who loves him is diligent to discipline him."

What makes this a half-truth is that "the rod" is certainly not the only way to discipline a child, and all discipline in the Bible is in the context of godly instruction. The point of the verse is not to say that children should be spanked whenever they misbehave! It is that godly correction is essential to raising a well-adjusted, spiritually strong adult.

No.10 "A fool and his money are soon parted."

This one may be experientially true, to the delight of advertising executives, but you won't find it in the Bible.

One big clue—in the Bible, being labeled a "fool" seldom has anything to do with intellectual capacity, knowledge or worldly wisdom. Instead, "The fool says in his heart, 'There is no God.' They are corrupt, they do abominable deeds; there is none who does good" (Psalm 14:1). That's a type of foolishness that crosses all boundaries of intellect and education.

How are we approaching the decision to have camp this summer?

WHAT WE WANT YOU TO KNOW: Our top priority guiding our decision-making regarding whether to run programs this summer is the health and safety of our campers, staff, and community.

We believe that camp is more necessary than ever in these times. Our staff are working tirelessly to respond to this changing situation and doing everything possible to hold open the possibility of running camp programs this summer. But for us to feel confident in welcoming people to camp and running programs this summer, there are several different "checkpoints" that must be cleared. Below, you can find those checkpoints explained in more detail, as well as action steps that are currently happening in that area.

Checkpoint #1: Group Gathering Regulations Currently, Wisconsin is under a "Safer at Home" order that extends until May 26, 2020. Even once this order is lifted, there will likely be restrictions on group gathering sizes for an undetermined amount of time. For camp programs to happen this summer, we must be able to safely comply with any existing state regulations limiting the size and type of group gatherings. What we're currently doing:

- •Closely monitoring all government regulations.
- •Staying up-to-date on the predicted trajectory of future restrictions.

Checkpoint #2: Operating Regulations Even once Wisconsin's "Safer at Home" order is lifted, there will be state and local guidelines regulating our normal summer operating procedures. For camp programs to happen this summer, we must be able to safely comply with any required practices without significantly compromising our ability to "do camp".

What we're currently doing:

- •Staying up to date on the current best practices being recommended for similar organizations.
- •Staying in communication with our local health department regarding potential operation this summer and what restrictions might be involved.
- •The American Camp Association (ACA) and Christian Camp and Conference Association (CCCA) are advocating for camps on a national level, working to develop COVID-19 guidance for overnight camps for this summer and to develop educational and operational resources for camps.

Checkpoint #3: Camper/Staff Care and Infection Control We're so thankful that COVID-19 appears to pose relatively little risk to the <20 age group that comprises the majority of our on-site population in the summer. At the same time, we recognize that many of our campers and staff come from households with at-risk individuals and also recognize the necessity to be able to quickly and efficiently contain any suspected on-site cases of Covid-19 in order to be able to operate. Camp programs will only happen this summer if we are confident in our policies and procedures related to both the prevention of on-site infections as well as quarantine procedures in the event of a suspected case.

What we're currently doing:

- •Staying up to date on current best practices and recommendations in this area.
- •Developing updated screening procedures for summer campers, staff, and other guests.
- •Developing updated policies and procedures related to infectious disease prevention at camp.
- •Developing updated policies and procedures for cleaning and disinfecting high touch areas of camp.
- •Consulting with experts to put together an infection control plan.

Checkpoint #4: Camp Logistics This is a rapidly changing situation and there is still much uncertainty surrounding what the next weeks and months will look like. This presents some significant logistical challenges in planning and preparing for camp this summer. For camp programs to happen this summer, we must be able to anticipate future needs, stockpile necessary supplies, have the support of our summer staff team, and be ready to "go" within a relatively short time frame.

What we're currently doing:

- •Surveying our summer staff to collect information about their ability and willingness to serve even in a shortened or otherwise impacted summer season.
- •Developing contingency plans in several different critical planning areas related to this summer.
- •Working with our suppliers to ensure our ability to adequately stock necessary items such as hand sanitizer and cleaning supplies.
