Hi (Your Name), kindly respond to my message when you receive it. I have a favor to ask. ~Pastor Richard "Rick" Williams Grace and Peace.

Now if you respond to this message, they will reply telling you that I am in a meeting and cannot be disturbed but could you please go out and purchase some sort of gift cards, (last time it was Apple). And then they let you know where to send them. They also say that I need the gift cards to give to some women who are battling breast cancer.

To the best of my knowledge, no one has sent them anything as of yet, please help me keep it that way. I have also reported the number as a scam and had it blocked. I also talked to Verizon and again reported the number. Last time it was a 414 area code number, again from the Milwaukee area which was also reported. The last time they tried this was on July 31, so it didn't take them long to try again. We are unsure of where they are getting their information. They are texting people by name, but some of the names have been for people I do not have in my contact list or on my phone. We also checked the church records to make sure they weren't hacking into the church system and found that a number of the people called were not in the church system. For example we had one person's home phone number but not their cell number and they had been contacted on their cell phone. We will continue to see if we can find the source but in the meantime, please remember, I will never, never, text you and ask you to send money or gift cards to anyone regardless of the circumstance. If you have any questions or concerns in regard to this matter please feel free to contact me any time. If you have any thoughts or ideas that might help us put a stop to it I would love to hear them. I am kind of hoping there is in eternity a special place for those people, particularly the ones that try and use other people and their trust to steal. (Continued on next page)

... said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, and eat bread there, and prophesy moon's light, those shadows came alive. Today, there, but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom." Then Amos answered and said to Amaziah, "I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but But the LORD took me from following the flock. and the Lord said to me, 'Go, prophesy to My people Israel."

Have you ever looked at your life and said, "God, I'm not the right person to be handling this?" I wonder if Amos said that to God. After all. He didn't go through seminary and learn how to be a prophet, the way normal people did it. He was a country man, someone who watched sheep and did a little tree care on the side.

And then one day God barged into his life and took him away to do something else—a different kind of shepherding, with much more ornery sheep. He sent him to speak God's message to the people of Israel, who had gone far away from the Lord and were doing all kinds of wickedness. As Amos put it, "they sell the righteous for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals ... [they] trample the head of the poor into the dust" (Amos 2:6b-7a). I bet there were days Amos wished he was back with the four-legged sheep!

You might feel that way too, if God has set a challenge before you—whether it's in your family or in your work or something to do with the community in which you live. Because God has a habit of choosing the last person you'd

expect for the job. I think He does it so we know how much we need His help. If we're aware of our weakness, we're going to lean on Jesus with all our weight—because we're desperate, and we have no other way to get through. Joshua 1:9 - (God said) "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

When I was a little boy, my bedroom was paneled with knotty pine.

In the twilight, with the room lights out and the summer sun sliding over the horizon, those knots and stained shapes took on all kinds of strange monster faces—at least in the mind's eye of a four-year-old boy.

In the winter, when the snow reflected the I'm an old man, but those memories are still very much with me.

Just as vivid is the time when my father came to I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. my bedside and asked, "Son, you don't have to be afraid since you've said your prayers. You do say your prayers at night, don't you?"

I assured him I did.

His next question was this: "And you do say your prayers in the morning, too? Right?"

I replied, "No, Dad, I don't have to. I'm not scared in the morning."

Now that I've grown up, I realize talking to God is not a once-a-day experience. The loving Lord most certainly wants to hear from me when I'm scared, but He also wants me to check in when things are going smoothly.

It's a sad thing, but many people still think of God as a refuge only when they're in trouble. They only speak to Him when their lives are filled with monster faces, terrific terrors, and they are frightened beyond imagination.

If you're one of these folks, may I, from my own experience, remind you that God hears you when your heart is filled with fear and trepidation (see

Psalm 94:19; Philippians 4:6-7). But He wants to hear from you at other times, too—even in the morning when you're not scared anymore.

Today, I encourage you to talk to the Savior who gave His life so you might live and so you might not be afraid. Jesus understands the things that bother and unsettle you.

He wants you to lean on Him. In fact, He tells each of us plainly, "Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27).

From childhood to old age, in darkness or daylight, Jesus is always with us.

WE PRAY: Lord Jesus, thank You for being with me in times of joy as well as times of anxiety and uncertainty. You are concerned about my simplest needs and worries. In Your Name, Amen.




We meet on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month, usually September through May, 1:00pm to 3:00pm.

## ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRST LUTHERAN HYMNALS 500 YEARS

#### INTRODUCTION

In 1523, Martin Luther wrote to Georg Spalatin (1484–1545), private secretary to Elector Frederick III ("the Wise") of Saxony. With his superb humanist education, Spalatin was sought by Luther as one skilled in the German language and capable of writing German hymns based on psalms. Thus, by 1523—a mere six years after the posting of the Ninety-Five Theses—Luther was committed to providing German-language hymns for the people to sing and was actively seeking gifted poets to work with him on this project. This work led to the publication of the first Lutheran hymnals in 1524 for which we now mark the five hundredth anniversary.



This is the first line of "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" as found in a 1524 hymnal.

The first Lutheran hymnal, *Etlich Cristlich lider*, sometimes referred to as the "Achtliederbuch" (literally, the "eight-hymn book"), was published in Nürnberg in 1524. Shortly thereafter, two competing publishers in Erfurt published booklets entitled *Enchiridion*, containing additional texts and melodies. Later that year, the earliest polyphonic settings of chorales appeared in the *Geystliche gesangk Buchleyn* of Johann Walter (1496–1570), published in Wittenberg, marking the beginning of Lutheran choral music.

Luther's hymn "Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice" was the first hymn in that first collection. This ten-stanza hymn was followed by Paul Speratus's (1484–1551) fourteen-stanza "Salvation unto Us Has Come." Both hymns clearly distinguish Law and Gospel and proclaim that the sinner is justified by God's grace through faith. Thus, what is noteworthy about this first Lutheran hymnal is the choice and prominent placement of these two hymns, both of which—in a concise, poetic manner—encapsulate the doctrine and teaching at the heart of the Lutheran Reformation.

The following list contains a selection of hymns that first appeared in one of the 1524 collections. Consider emphasizing some of these hymns in the coming months or using them in connection with the celebration of the Lutheran Reformation. Some accompanying CPH resources are also suggested.

#### Stepping up to the plate

I coached my son's Little League team. We lost every game until the last. In the final inning, we were in the field, ahead by one, with no outs and the bases loaded. The batter hit a line drive right to our third baseman. She stuck out her glove with one hand and covered her eyes with the other. The ball landed in her glove. She jumped up and down, stomping on third base to make the second out. Then she stuck out her glove to show me the ball, tagging the runner coming in—an unassisted triple play! Our team ran to the pitcher's mound in celebration as if it were the World Series. —*Robert Drozel, Exton, PA* 

While we are on the subject of hymns and we have a pages about apples, I searched for any hymns pertaining to apples. There weren't any I could find until fairly recent ones. But, when I wanted to print the lyrics I came across an article that told about the song long ago.

Jesus Christ the Apple Tree (also known as Apple Tree and, in its early publications, as Christ Compared to an Apple-tree) is a poem, possibly intended for use as a carol, written in the 18th century. It has been set to music by a number of composers, including Jeremiah Ingalls (1764–1838), Elizabeth Poston (1905–1987) and John Rutter.

The first known publication, beginning **The Tree** of Life My Soul Hath Seen, was in London's *Spiritual Magazine* in August, 1761. This credits "R.H." as the submitter and presumed author. R.H. has been shown most likely to refer to Rev. Richard Hutchins, a Calvinist Baptist clergyman then in Long Buckby, Northamptonshire. Another early printing, which cannot be dated and could be earlier, is an English broadsheet. This broadsheet uses the term "Methodists," which certainly places it after about 1730, when the term first came into use at Oxford University, and probably substantially later, when the religious movement had spread.

The hymn's first known appearance in a hymnal, and in America, was in 1784 in *Divine Hymns, or Spiritual Songs: for the use of Religious Assemblies and Private Christians* compiled by Joshua Smith, a lay Baptist minister from New Hampshire. It became prevalent in American publications but not English ones. Consequently, American authorship was sometimes assumed despite the lack of evidence

The song may be an allusion to both the apple tree in Song of Solomon 2:3 which has been interpreted as a metaphor representing Jesus, and to his description of his life as a tree of life in Luke 13:18–19 and elsewhere in the New Testament including Revelation 22:1–2 and within the Old Testament in Genesis. Apple trees were commonly grown in England and there was an old English tradition of wassailing or wishing health to apple trees on Christmas Eve. The song is now performed by choirs around the world, especially during the Christmas season as a Christmas carol. [5]

Another motivation of the song may have been to Christianize old English winter season songs used in wassailing the apple orchards — pouring out libations or engaging in similar ceremonies to seek fertility of the trees.



Our themes this month have included: the beach, Disney, Zoo and Transportation.


The Bible stories we have been reading included: Breakfast on the Beach, Jesus can make our dreams come true, The Floating Zoo and Road to Emmaus.

John 6:35-40, 43-47 - Jesus said to them, "I am the Bread of Life; whoever comes to Me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in Me shall never thirst. But I said to you that you have seen Me and yet do not believe. All that the Father gives Me will come to Me, and whoever comes to Me I will never cast out. For I have come down from heaven, not to do My own will but the will of Him who sent Me. And this is the will of Him who sent Me, that I should lose nothing of all that He has given Me, but raise it up on the last day. For this is the will of My Father, that everyone who looks on the Son and believes in Him should have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day." ... Jesus answered them, "Do not grumble among yourselves. No one can come to Me unless the Father who sent Me draws Him. And I will raise Him up on the last day. It is written in the Prophets, 'And they will all be taught by God.' Everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to Me—not that anyone has seen the

Father except He who is from God; He has seen the Father. Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever believes has eternal life."

About the scariest thing I can think of is that someday, somehow, I might lose my faith in Christ. That idea terrifies me. Go away from the One who loved me so much that He died for me, and then rose again? Lose the love



and joy and peace that I have in Him? Dear God, let it never happen!

That might be why Jesus is so quick to assure us that God protects us when we belong to Jesus. Jesus says, "All that the Father gives Me will come to Me, and whoever comes to Me I will *never* cast out .... And this is the will of Him who sent Me, that I should lose *nothing* of all that He has given Me, but raise it up on the last day. For this is the will of My Father, that *everyone* who looks on the Son and believes in Him should have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day."

Notice those words: "never," "nothing," "everyone." Jesus will *never* cast us out, He will lose *nothing* God has trusted to Him. And *everyone* who trusts in Him will have life.

Our safety doesn't lie in our own hands. It lies in the will of God the Father, who brought us to Jesus in the first place. It lies in Jesus' commission from the Father, to lose nothing and nobody of all that God has given Him, but to keep us all safe till the Last Day when He returns to earth. Jesus will not fail. He has already gone to the cross for us, already risen from the dead for our sake. How could He desert us now?
